How to use educational research to improve teaching practice

This mastermind educational research workshop will take a 4-Point approach to developing and implementing educational research to improve teaching practice.

4 Ps:

- 1. Problem
- 2. Plan
- 3. Proof (theory, evidence, data or outputs)
- 4. Put into practice

Using a real radiography educational research project as a case study the 4-point approach will be described. Important points for consideration at each stage of the 4-point process will be highlighted. Delegates will then use the mastermind group approach and the 4-point plan to develop and discuss an educational research project they would like to develop through a series of small group dicsussions. The project does not need to be well developed or defined before the workshop. Using the skills and expertise of the mastermind group delegates can leave the workshop with the basis of an educational research proposal that they can continue to refine and implement after the conference.

Link to workshop Musharrat is an award winning antiracism and decolonising occupational therapy educator, influencer and leader - RCOT Merit award 2023 and Impact Award 2024 for excellence in article in Journal of Occupational Science. In the school of Allied and Community Health she is, Associate Professor and Head of Division in Occupational Therapy at London South Bank University (LSBU). Musharrat leads the decolonising strategy for Allied Health Professions' education curricula at LSBU. Her 'Decolonising Curriculum Wheel: A Reflection Framework' has become part of the LSBU academic curriculum framework and has had international reach. She has an edited book, 'Antiracist occupational Therapy: Unsettling the status quo' and has written 2 chapters, one with co-authors, in another popular book with global reach, 'Antiracism in Higher Education: An action guide for change'. Musharrat has a portfolio covering a variety of occupational therapy practitioner and academic roles and responsibilities, strategic and operational level work in higher education and health settings. She is co-founder of BAMEOTUK, a network of Black and Minoritised occupational therapy students, practitioners and educators campaigning to disrupt the status quo of institutional racism/discrimination in the profession and professional body. She attends national and international events discussing decolonising occupational therapy. Musharrat offers an antiracism or decolonising workplace transformation workshop to continue inspiring organisations to change away from the status quo.

Prior to this Laura was Head of Health research at a Think Tank and Associate Professor at the University of Lincoln. Laura is a HCPC registered Therapeutic Radiographer. Laura completed her PhD in spring 2024 titled: Enabling coping in people living with cancer and severe mental illness.

Melanie qualified from the University of Central England in Birmingham as a Therapeutic Radiographer in 1999, after completing placement at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital, Birmingham. She spent her clinical career at The James Cook University Hospital in Middlesbrough until she left clinical practice in 2014 to become a Senior Lecturer at Sheffield Hallam University (SHU). She is currently the programme lead for the MSc Advanced Clinical Practice (ACP) Radiotherapy and Oncology, PgC Enhanced Practice Radiotherapy and Oncology and leads the e-portfolio supported route for accreditation with the centre for advancing practice. Within the College of Radiographers, she is a member of the Radiotherapy Advisory Group (RAG), assessor and member of the Accreditation and Approval Board (AAB) and facilitator of the special interest group (SIG) for Advancing Practice in Radiography (APRAD-SIG). She is an elected committee member within the Association of Advanced Practice Educators (AAPE), representing Therapeutic Radiographers and AHPs, and the international lead for the community of practice for AAPE. Currently, she is leading on the development of the non-surgical oncology advanced practice credential, a multi-disciplinary framework to support the education and training of advanced practitioners in nonsurgical oncology. She is a reviewer for the Centre of Advancing Practice, NHSe, in advancing practice credentials and programme accreditation. Melanie is a member of the International Community of Practice in Advanced Practice radiation therapy (iCoP APRT) and a member of the Council of Deans for Health Advanced Practice project group. She is also a reviewer for journals such as Journal of Radiotherapy in Practice (JRP), Technical Innovations & Patient Support in Radiation Oncology (TIPSRO) and Radiography. Previously she has been seconded National Cancer and Diagnostic team NHS England as a Subject Matter Expert for Therapeutic Radiography in Advanced Practice and Subject Matter Expert for Aspirant Cancer Career and Education Development (ACCEND) Framework Higher Education Institute scoping on pre-registration cancer curriculum across all health care professions.

Julie qualified in 1986 as a therapeutic radiographer and worked in the NHS until 2009. She then moved into education as a Senior Lecturer, then Associate Professor in Radiotherapy and Oncology at St George's University of London. Julie has a strong interest in person-centred care, which was the focus of her Masters in Oncology Practice. As an educator Julie has interests in student outcomes and support, having a strategic role across St George's as Associate Dean for Student Outcomes. Educational research is an important area of practice for Julie, particularly when co-created and shared with students through student-staff partnerships. Julie's recent Educational Doctorate explored academic educator perceptions and experiences of caring in radiotherapy.

Heidi was awarded a Fellowship from the College of Radiographers in 2015 for her contribution to the development of the profession through her research. Heidi is the founder and chair of the Breast Radiotherapy Interest Group (BRIG), a professional group for Therapeutic Radiographers (Radiation Therapists), Physicists and dosimetrists specialising in radiotherapy for breast cancer. From 2020-2023 Heidi was Director of the Health Research Institute at Hallam and in August 2023 Heidi was awarded an honorary fellowship from the Institute of Physics and Engineering in Medicine for her contribution to research in radiotherapy. Heidi was awarded an MBE in the 2024 Kings New Year honours list for services to Radiography. Heidi has completed a number of educational research projects including the development of an intrapreneurial pedagogyand is currently chief investigator for three radiotherapy breast cancer studies: the SuPPORT 4 All (S4A) study, the Calibrate study and the

Ruth is Professor in Diagnostic Radiography and the Head of Allied Health Professions in the School of Health and Sports Sciences at the University of Suffolk. Ruth is a Diagnostic Radiographer by background. Senior Allied Health Professions Advisor, Office of the Chief AHP Officer, NHS England

The Allied Health Professions represent the third-largest clinical workforce in the NHS in England with over 210,000 registered staff.
